Leila: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame. Here to Judge today is me, Leila Navabi.

Priya: That's just my vibe.

Robin: My husband has been doing too much charity work, leave him!

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: It's time! Get goin'.

Robin: That would be such a good like Saturday night game show. Like a reverse dating show.

Leila: Oh my god!

Robin: It's three couples who are going to get divorced.

Leila: Oh my god. Imagine.

Robin: That's never been done before has it?

Priya: I imagine if you had three couples on and like the aim of the game was to stay together at the end of it, the ones that ended up staying together would be so disappointed at the end.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: Whereas all the happy divorced people would just be running around the place banging.

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Leila: [Laughs] Happy divorced people.

Robin: [Laughs] But imagine like three divorced couples go on ITV1 on Saturday night and they've all got issues. They all around about to get divorced and they audience votes.

Leila: Is this swapping, do they swap?

Robin: No. The audience vote at the end, it's hosted by Bradley Walsh.

Leila: Oh one of them gets a free divorce.

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: Boo!!!

Priya: Get outta here!

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Oh my god.

Priya: All of the LA lawyers are immediately like kicking off, flippin' tables.

Robin: We now go live to our LA lawyers!

Priya: I would love to do all that. What's your dream warm up show? Like stupid answers only.

Robin: Um?

Priya: I'd love to do Question Time.

Leila: [Laughs hysterically]

Priya: Really sour the room before they all start.

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Robin: What do you think of me? [laughs]

Leila: Oh that's so good. Go on Hal give me the worst you've got!

Robin: [Laughs] Oh god.

Leila: I want to do Hole in the Wall.

Priya: Amazing.

Robin: Oh great that'd be fun.

Leila: Imagine doing a warm up for Hole in the Wall?

Robin: That would be really fun.

Priya: What if they never let you do the Hole in the Wall?

Robin: They wouldn't.

Leila: They wouldn't.

Robin: They wouldn't let you do it because it would be like you'd break a prop wouldn't you? You'd have to just sort of chat to them about it.

Priya: The tension would be too much.

Robin: You might have to bring in your own hot wall with holes in.

Leila: I'd just have a slideshow of holes in walls.

Leila: [Laughs]

Robin: Of fish? No! That's disgusting.

Leila: Yeah but that's cannibalism.

Priya: Fish eat fish. Fish eat fish.

Robin: Yeah they can have mad fish disease.

Priya: Fish eat fish.

Leila: Well it's another reason to hate fish.

Priya: I don't know how many times I can tell you that fish eat fish.

Leila: But like what sort of fish is in fish food?

Priya: Um I imagine whatever the horse equivalent of the fish world is. Like there's horse in dog food.

Leila: What a whale?

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Robin: Seahorse!

Priya: Seahorse!

Leila: [Laughs] OK fine.

Priya: Of course!

Leila: Oh.

Priya: I had a tank of fish and one of them went missing once and we never did find him.

Robin: [Laughs] Missing!

Priya: And he definitely got eaten by all of the other fish. He did, so that was where he went.

Leila: There's always a bully who eats the other fish.

Robin: How big?

Priya: He was like [laughs] This big.

Leila: That's great for the podcast.

Priya: And all of the other fish were like this big.

Leila: You could do anything. You have to use actual metrics, come on.

Priya: So he was.

Leila: Is that a plum?

Priya: I want to say, is that two inches?

Robin: A plum?!

Priya: Plum size.

Leila: [Laughs] Yeah fruit is a metric measurement.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: He was about the size of a flat plum.

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Leila: A flat plum! What's a flat plum?

Priya: He was so flat though, he was so flat.

Leila: He's a fish [laughs].

Priya: And then all of the other fish were teeny tiny.

Leila: Fish are like renowned for being flat. Like if anything they're the flattest creature you can find.

Priya: He was so flat, I really hated him. I was glad he went.

Robin: How old were you? Went? He was killed! He was murdered by his brethren.

Priya: [Laughs] How old? I was in my early teens. So I would have been about 13/14.

- Leila: ...a cup of tea [laughs]. Like an old builder.
- Priya: It was delicious.
- Robin: [Laughs] Is this like a nana?
- Leila: Yeah it was such a nana move.
- Robin: I can't taste anymore. If they don't have bangers I'll just have carb.
- Leila: Yeah.
- Priya: At one point Leila went 'Do you have something like broccoli to go with it?' And he went 'We don't have broccoli'. I was like fair enough mate.
- Robin: That is the weirdest thing I think. I went to Balans in Soho after a News Jack wrap party. And I was very, very poor and couldn't afford a burger there.

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Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: Right.

Leila: You know like anyone who had like a map from Regatta or any of those like.

Robin: Right. Yeah.

Priya: Little tiny baby Birkenstocks.

Leila: Yeah like.

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- Robin: We went walking, like we went to the Garth and stuff. But we didn't do like homemade granola bars.
- Leila: No but did you have little snacks that you take with you? Like grapes and those crunchy Nature Valley bars?
- Robin: We had Tracker bars which is essentially the same thing.
- Priya: Yeah you had a crunchy childhood.
- Robin: Did I?
- Leila: You actually did yeah. I have that vibe.
- Robin: Fair enough. I'm not going to deny my roots, I'm not going to pretend I'm working class [laughs].
- Leila: It's not a bad thing.

- Leila: [Laughs]

- Leila: No, no, no correct.
- Priya: I could not even picture my mother coring an apple for any of her children.
- Leila: No. Did she use one of those tools? Or was it a knife?

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- Robin: No I think it was by hand.
- Leila: She punched it out.
- Priya: I genuinely remember being handed an apple as a child with a knife.
- Robin: Oh sure.
- Leila: What cutting an apple with a knife?
- Priya: Yeah.
- Leila: Yeah that's normal is it not?
- Priya: Yeah, yeah, yeah but as a child just being handed the knife and being like crack on [laughs].
- Leila: [Laughs]

- Leila: Yeah [laughs].

Priya: It does.

Robin: It does.

Priya: It tastes dry like it needs to moisturise.

Leila: It tastes like it's got eczema.

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Do you know what I mean? Like that is the vibe.

Robin: This feels like a roast battle against pears.

Leila: I mean I also eczema.

Robin: Hey pears!

Leila: It's dry.

Priya: Yeah it's dry.

Leila: And it's flaky and like.

Robin: But it's so nice inside.

Priya: Mmmm.

Leila: Like Leila Navabi.

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: That's it you've got to get through the scabby eczema exterior to get to the beautiful insides.

Leila: To get to the goods!

Robin: Eww [laughs]

Leila: How repugnant. Um, I have nothing else to say about this one apart from I respect it. I respect it.

Robin: I like this person. I think I would find it a bit weird if someone was doing it at my table but I'd quite enjoy,

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they clearly don't give any shit and that is energy, they're just trying to have a burger, equally those posh burger places are quite nice. So I do think they seem a bit dickish.

Priya: I don't think they're an asshole but I do think they're a weirdo.

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: You need to run a travel blog where this is just all of the content. Is just you aggressively interviewing people about clearly average holidays.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: Was it all right was it? What'd you have?

Robin: Yeah. Five star was it?

Leila: No one has my pears tweet.

Priya: Do you want me to like it?

Robin: You did it a second ago.

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Leila: It was five minutes, it's got nothing. It's failed, it's in the bin.

Robin: It's 8pm.

Leila: That's not good enough.

Robin: Retweet it at 9am tomorrow.

Leila: [Sighs] It's not good enough.

Robin: What was the actual tweet?

Leila: Pears have eczema.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: [Laughs]
