Priya: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame. Here to Judge today is me, Priya Hall.

Robin: Me, Robin Morgan.

Leila: And me, Leila Navabi.

'Am I the asshole for taking back my parents' Christmas presents? Growing up everything was pre-owned or handed down. Johan: Um I'm not sure.

Robin: If you had a guess.

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Robin: 15, 1, 5?

Johan: Yeah.

Robin: What do you reckon to my friend Leila?

Johan: I think about 10.

Robin: 10. And what do you think about that man there?

Johan: Uh, I think 32.

Robin: 32? Who's that man there?

Johan: [Laughs] You.

Robin: Is it me?

Johan: Yeah.

Robin: And how old are you? You're what 35?

Johan: Uh no I'm four and half.

Robin: You're four and a half, I always forget that. OK thank you Johan could you say goodbye?

Johan: Bye!

Leila: I think technology shouldn't be a Christmas present. I think it's a weird Christmas present.

Robin: What about a Nintendo DS?

Leila: No. Never anymore. I mean look, it was bad. I spent so much of like the winter just on my DS. I was thinking about buying a Nintendo Wii the other day.

Priya: Like an old timey Nintendo Wii?

Leila: Well they've discontinued them.

Priya: Have they?

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Leila: Mm.

Priya: Oh. So you can do like the Wii Fit stuff that does nothing?

Leila: What do you mean that does nothing? I was so fit from doing Wii Fit.

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: I'm serious. Did you never do Wii Fit?

Priya: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: Were you like 12-years-old and it tells you you're an obese old woman?

Priya: Yeah, yeah.

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: That's humbling, that was humbling as a child.

Leila: And then the way you'd remedy that was by stepping on and off the board. So bum, bum, bum, bum, dah, dah, dah. Do you remember that game?

Priya: Um? No.

Leila: Oh just me.

Priya: Is it like Dance Mat?

Leila: No you were just stepping onto the Wii board and then off the Wii board. That was the game.

Priya: Oh [laughs].

Leila: Oh I loved that.

Priya: Mm.

- Priya: Yeah.

- Priya: And now she's like 'But I should be invited to Christmas dinner because I'm your daughter so it's rude to uninvite me'.
- Leila: That's weird. There's so many people on the planet, why are you sleeping with your fucking brother-in-law?
- Priya: It's so weird.
- Robin: Drama mate.
- Leila: I'm literally sure I've said this before on the podcast but you don't want to be igloo sisters with your actual sister.
- Priya: Yeah.
- Robin: Oh no we have talked about this because I asked what that was. That's when you have the same sexual partner.
- Priya: Yeah.
- Leila: Yeah.
- Robin: And why igloo because igloo is a metaphor for vagina?
- Leila: Yes. There's another one it's Eskimo brothers isn't it?
- Priya: Mm. Feels problematic.
- Leila: Yeah, yeah, yeah it definitely is.
- Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: If I was the sister or the mum or?

Leila: [Laughs] Any scenario.

Robin: If you were trapped on a desert island.

Leila: Let's go through a door.

Priya: OK let's go through a door. If I was the mum I think yeah she wouldn't be able to come to Christmas dinner, oh my God. No.

Robin: But I think for me it's the blocking thing. That's the one thing that feels ever so slightly out of. It feels quite petulant.

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: When you are the head of a family type thing.

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: Yeah. Yeah.

Robin: Cheating. No, no, no, Christmas, Christmas.

Leila: Christmas [Sings] Christmas.

Priya: It makes it sound as well like it's a very recent thing. So it's only the Christmas dinner that has made it all come out.

Robin: Yeah sure so they would have found out quite recently.

Leila: Christmas dinner makes a lot of things come out. Poo.

Priya: Pardon? [laughs]

- Priya: [Laughs]
- Leila: I agree.

- Priya: No Potato's side.
- Robin: I'm so sorry.
- Priya: I really thought Potato was going to be the one that was the wrong one in this.
- Leila: Yeah.

- Priya: And stinkbugs are famously cheaters.
- Leila: Yeah.
- Robin: [Laughs] No mention of the two older sons?
- Priya: There's an edit.
