Leila: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame. Here to Judge today is me, Leila Navabi.

Priya: Me, Priya Hall.

Robin: And me, Robin Morgan.

Robin: Ready?

Priya: There's a delay on Robin.

Robin: Oh really?

Priya: Oh no it's fine now.

Leila: Only a little bit.

Robin: Are you sure?

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: But it's like when we see each other in person I'm like oh wow you're really quick and on it [snaps] I'm like really impressed so it's a good thing ultimately.

Robin: What do you mean?

Leila: Like because there's always been a delay so I've always thought you were a bit slow [laughs].

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Then we see each other and I'm like wow he's like so smart, so quick witted.

Robin: That's [laughs] that's really funny.

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Leila: [Laughs] OK.

Robin: Right shall I do it?

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: OK.

Leila: [Laughs]

Robin: [Clears throat] 'Am the asshole for wanting to play COD Call Of Duty on Christmas instead of spending time with my wife and kids. My birthday is on Christmas day. I have always spent my birthday celebrating Christmas and never doing anything I want. My son is three and my daughter is 6 months. I spend a lot of time with them and my wife, and barely see my friends anymore. This Christmas I just want to play COD with the boys. They're all going to be play COD on Christmas/my birthday and I don't want to miss out. They are never online at the same time as me usually. My wife is incredibly angry with me and wants to throw my new Xbox out the window. I'm angry because I just want to play COD with the boys on my birthday. Am I the asshole?'

Leila: Yes.

Priya: How sad are all of your friends' lives that they're all playing Call Of Duty on Christmas day?

Robin: Yeah it is quite sad. I mean how old do you reckon they are?

Priya: Don't know.

Robin: The son is three.

Leila: But there's his wife and kids.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: If he were 13 and this was a Nintendo DS then that would be fine right?

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Robin: Yeah.

Priya: [Snorts]

Leila: But this is like they are like what?

Priya: You know how it's really hard to age you based on your references.

Leila: Nintendo DS?

Priya: Nintendo DS I feel like...

Leila: That was massive when I was a kid.

Priya: Was it?

Leila: Yeah. What? Was it?

Priya: I feel like it's ancient technology.

Robin: That does ruffle for me but I think Priya as soon as we start to stop being teenagers everything feels like it's in that bracket.

Priya: Sure.

Robin: But I don't want to get back into POGS. I don't want to get back into POGS.

Leila: No I didn't do POGS. No Nintendo DS I had, do you remember PictoChat on Nintendo DS?

Priya: No.

Leila: Like you'd write a little message, in sleepovers, so you could only use it in the same room as the other person with a DS, it was sort of redundant. People would write messages like.

Robin: Was it Bluetooth?

Leila: I think it was yeah, PictoChat.

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Priya: But you were in the same room so you could literally do it on a piece of paper.

Leila: Yeah but you'd be in a sleepover and they'd be like 'Goodnight girls' and then they'd shut the door and it would be like 'Your mum's a slag'.

Priya: Sure [laughs].

Robin: That took a turn. That took a turn [laughs].

Leila: Oh Christ.[Laughs] But do you know what I mean, you'd sit there and like...

Priya: Your mum's a slag [laughs].

Leila: I don't know, I never said that to anyone in my life [laughs].

Priya: I'm 100% sure that that's the only message you've ever sent.

Leila: Yeah it's what I sent to everyone, yeah exactly.

Robin: Who would you have said that to? The person throwing the sleepover or a separate mum?

Leila: Yeah their mum who was telling me to be quiet.

Robin: Right, right, right. Oh so [laughs]

Priya: You said it about the woman who you just saw who is housing you for the night.

Leila: Um I would like to say that I spent all Christmas day when I was about maybe eight or nine playing SIMS on the DS.

Robin: So one year ago.

Leila: Last year, yeah. Yeah. And playing that game all day.

Priya: But did you ignore your wife and kids while doing it?

Leila: Yeah on the SIMS, yeah.

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- Robin: [Laughs] You trapped them into a room...
- Leila: I always like played like middle-aged men on SIMS. Like if I was creating a SIM I would always be a man.
- Robin: That's interesting.
- Priya: You presented that like it was going to be a surprise but that's very on brand for Leila Navabi.
- Robin: Do you think so?
- Priya: Do you not think?
- Robin: Why?
- Priya: Because she's tiny old man.
- Leila: Yeah why Priya? Why? Are you homophobic?
- Priya: She's a tiny old man.
- Leila: Is it because I'm a lesbian you think I'm a man?
- Priya: Yes. Yes that's what I'm thinking. You're a tiny old man in a young woman's body [laughs]. Your kids ages are about right so that when your daughter was six-months-old your son was three right? Is this you Robin?
- Robin: Yeah there's two and a half, it's exactly this.
- Priya: Mm-hmm.
- Robin: It's exactly those ages. It's not me, I don't play Call Of Duty because I'm a nice person [laughs].
- Priya: [Laughs]
- Leila: Are you morally opposed to like gun games?
- Robin: No I love games and always have done.
- Leila: Really?

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Robin: But I was good at them as like a 12-year-old and then never really played them and then...

Leila: I think I'm morally opposed to them.

Priya: Are you?

Leila: Mm.

Robin: Why?

Priya: On what grounds?

Leila: The grounds of morality.

Priya: Oh [laughs] Nice and vague.

Leila: I just think they perpetuate violence. And maybe that's a really fruity opinion to have, I just don't think they're a great idea.

Priya: Do you think kids are going to play Call Of Duty and then they're going to go out and do wars?

Leila: No because there's not guns in this country but I know for a fact it happens in other countries.

Priya: You know for a fact?

Leila: Yes have you not watched those documentaries about those children that go and shoot all their classmates?

Priya: This is like the Premier Inn documentary again. It's not fact Leila just because it's in documentary form.

Robin: Umm do you genuinely believe that video games influence people?

Leila: I don't know.

Robin: Or just sort of desensitise?

Leila: I think it desensitises you...

Priya: Yeah OK yeah.

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Leila: ...in a way that's probably not great.

Robin: Mm.

Leila: I would like to ask another question which playing COD on Christmas/my birthday. Is this person born on Christmas, is this person Jesus Christ?

Robin: [Draws breath shocked] Oh.

Priya: Is this Jesus Christ?

Robin: Do you reckon Jesus would be good at Call Of Duty?

Leila: Amazing. The best.

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: Do you reckon? I reckon it would hurt him to hold the controller because of the wounds in his hands from the nails.

Priya: Sure, sure.

Leila: [Laughs hysterically]

Leila: I mean that absolutely can't stay in [laughs].

Robin: [Laughs] Why not?

Leila: Is my mother.

Robin: Yeah sure [laughs].

Leila: Who said to me the other day, who I'm going to announce on Here to Judge said to me the other day 'Leila, Robin' [laughs] I'm not laughing because it's not

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true, I'm laughing because it's just such a funny thing to say, just in this context. 'Robin's the best comedian in the UK'.

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: [Laughs hysterically]

Robin: Oh God.

Leila: But also, it's just the way she said it.

Priya: It's such a solemn...

Leila: Yeah and she was like 'You're very lucky to be working with him'.

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: And now you've made fun of Jesus Christ so.

Robin: I think I'm such a talented comedian Debbie will know that I do not mean it.

Leila: I love that everyone knows her name just because she likes everyone's tweets.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: That analysis is based on only the Aberystwyth Comedy Festival show. And you were the favourite therefore you are the best comedian in the UK.

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: I don't think I'm the best comedian in the Google Meet call.

Leila: You absolutely are.

Priya: You 100% are.

Leila: I'm sorry [laughs].

Priya: No that's a fair assessment.

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Robin: Shout out to Debbie Navabi thank you very much, I appreciate it. I am not the best comedian in the UK. Yeah.

Leila: OK anything anyone wishes to add?

Priya: I don't like the bit where he says 'I spend a lot of time with my wife, I barely see my friends anymore'.

Robin: Yeah it's bleak, it's really fucking bleak.

Priya: It's a little bit pass agg isn't it?

Leila: [Singing]

Robin: It just sort of seems.

Priya: That's what this song is about.

Leila: Yeah in the bleak.

Priya: Yeah it's about this man not being able to hang out with his friends and play murder games.

Robin: Murder games! [Laughs]

Leila: Murder games, murder games [singing] OK I think there's an edit.

Robin: Would you like me to read it?

Leila: Yeah please.

Robin: OK. 'OK I'm getting flamed here, and I feel like I'm the asshole but I still don't think it's a crazy ask. I've never really celebrated my birthday. I was lucky if anyone other than my brother said the words 'happy birthday' to me. My mum was super religious and made us spend every Christmas at church from 8am until 8pm.' Christ! 'The only acknowledgement I ever got from my family was a cake after dinner and a pack of socks once. I left home the day after my high school graduation and that's when I met my boys that I mention in my post. We've been everywhere together, have literally saved each other's

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lives and they are my brothers. They've always made me feel like my birthday was actually my birthday and not just Christmas. My wife has done this too, but not to the extent that the boys have. Also, we haven't gotten together since before my son was born. We all live in different states and never see each other anymore.' Does that change your opinion?

Priya: No because can't they just do it on a different day?

Leila: And why is he socialising with his beloved boys with killing games? Like can you just like have a roast?

Robin: Yeah I guess if they live in different states and stuff it's a way of doing things.

Leila: They should start a podcast [laughs].

Leila: [Laughs] I still can't get over it.

Robin: It's a funny joke and I would be upset if it didn't make it in [laughs].

Priya: [Laughs] I think it's fine. I think it's fine.

Leila: I think it's quite camp. I always thought that crown on his head looked so sheik.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: What the crown of thorns?

Leila: I loved it.

Priya: Yeah with his little blood drops.

Leila: I think that's quite queer do you know what I mean? It's quite like queer, I think it's quite camp.

Priya: I was about to say it's the straightest thing you've ever said is to say that Jesus on the cross is fit.

Leila: It's camp as Christmas, you're kidding.

Priya: Oh it is, it is camp.

Robin: Camp [laughs].

Priya: And so is everything to do with Catholicism.

Leila: It is camp! It's so! 'Drink my blood. Drink this wine'.

Priya: The obsession with the Virgin Mary.

Leila: 'Eat this bread, eat this bread it's my body'. It is camp as Christmas. And then he had a fucking crown on his head, I'll put this little flower crown on me while I hang naked.

Priya: [Laughs]

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Leila: With a body fat percentage of 0.2.

Robin: Yeah he was ripped wasn't he?

Priya: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: He was.

Robin: I just love the fact you said 'Camp as Christmas' but it's literally Christ [laughs].

Leila: Yeah exactly. Where do you think that it comes from? Camp as Christmas.

Robin: Because he was really camp, do you reckon?

Leila: Yes!

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: Please. He was...

Robin: Do you reckon?

- Robin: Primitive pants isn't it?
- Leila: A cloth for your loin. The more I think of it the more I think he's a gay icon.
- Robin: Jesus Christ, Shannon Matthews.
- Priya: [Laughs]
- Leila: I'm going to have a Christmas party and we're all going to dress up as gay icons but they have to like specific to my, like what I think is camp...
- Priya: Your definition right OK.
- Leila: ...in that regard. So it's like Jesus, Shannon Matthews, like...
- Priya: I can't wait to hear this. Go on.
- Robin: Buddha.
- Leila: Buddha oh please, yeah. All the gay gods, all the Greek ones, all like historical.
- Priya: Oh yeah for sure.
- Leila: There's nothing more gay than being a god. There isn't.
- Robin: Yeah I agree. I think. I don't know.
- Leila: I dare you to disagree with me.
- Robin: Um? No.
- Priya: [Laughs] Oh there's another edit.

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Robin: Oh hello. ' OK, I was not planning on playing all day. I planned on opening presents with the family then hopping on with the boys around noon. I get what everyone is saying, but I still don't think it's a big ask. Priya: Asshole.

Leila: Yeah asshole.

Robin: Go.

Priya: My friend's brother went out on Christmas eve, brought a girl home and then had to drive her back Christmas morning but wanted to open his presents first, this was when he was like 19. So she had to sit there while the whole family was opening their Christmas presents before he would drive her home.

Robin: That's amazing.

- Leila: Yeah. You have to tell the podcast about your musical.
- Priya: Oh my god. There's been a break, things have gotten weird in the break and I accidentally got cast in a musical.

Robin: OK.

Leila: But he comes on your sofa behind you and like nestles on you.

Priya: He does, he does come on the sofa behind me.

Robin: Right and do you think?

Priya: And then he'll sort of smack me in the face sometimes.

Robin: Do you think he's planting the hairs? [laughs]

Priya: Yeah so gently. Remember me.

Leila: What like a hair transplant? Like he's like hair plugging you.

Priya: Yeah that's exactly it but in my ears.

Priya: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

- Leila: Do you want details?
- Priya: Is it someone who kills cats in Croydon?
- Leila: There's a man or a person in Croydon who kills people's pet cats, guts them and then lays them out in front of their houses.
- Priya: Eww!
- Robin: But the first thing he does is he gets the owner and puts one of their cat hairs in their ear.
- Leila: Yeah so you've been chosen.
- Robin: Yeah.
- Priya: Good. Good luck getting that cat, he is 100% guts.
- Robin: The Croydon Cat Killer was murdered today by a cat.
- Leila: [Laughs] Do you think the cat that kills the Croydon Cat Killer will be called?

- Leila: The Croydon Cat Killer is a cat?
- Priya: Yeah. It's like old cats who have been the Croydon Cat Killer.

- Priya: The Croydon Cat Killer's, killer cat.

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Leila: Yeah.

Priya: Yeah.

Priya: Oh I see! He's a killer who's a cat.

Leila: He's a killer who's a cat.

Priya: Sure.

Leila: [Sings] Croydon Cat Killer.

Robin: This would make a really good rap number in a musical.

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: The Croydon Cat Killer musical?

Robin: The Croydon Cat Killer's cat killer.

Priya: I'll pitch it to my musical friends, my musical theatre friends.

Robin: Please do.

Leila: [Laughs] Yeah you could do that. They'll love it. They can't wait to see it. You should get a grant.

Priya: To do the Croydon Cat Killer?

Leila: Musical.

Priya: On the WMC.

Leila: [Speaks Welsh] obviously.

Priya: Oh yeah obviously.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: And Croydon.

Leila: What's killer in Welsh?

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Priya: Lladdwr. Murderer.

Leila: Lladdwr?

Priya: wr.

Leila: Right.

Robin: Oh that's beautiful, it's almost worth becoming a killer. Almost.

Priya: So you could be reported on [speaks Welsh].

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: [Sings theme tune] Go on.

Priya: [Sings in Welsh]

Robin: [Pling] Out of tune.

Robin: Totally.
